On page 51, a portion of the published text has been mistakenly set as an indented displayed quotation; it omits quotation marks and attributes the quote wrongly to another author (Doyle 2008). The following paragraph should have appeared as follows, without indentation:

Proceeding from the propositions outlined by Doyle, then, we can see how arguments for engaging in international democracy promotion can be built on these foundations. Indeed, democracy promotion itself has been credited with the status of an 'international norm' (McFaul 2004–2005) on the understanding that democracy is the most desirable regime type both for its intrinsic value and its instrumental value. President Obama's advisor on democracy promotion, McFaul has also argued that '... the United States no longer holds a monopoly on the business of democracy promotion. That development is a sign that such policy is not just a US national interest (or camouflage for other US national interests), but an international norm embraced by other states, transnational organizations and international networks' (McFaul 2004–2005, p. 148).
